I see a lot of book synopses that claim works by lesser known authors are King-like or that their writing style is similar to Koontz. I always take these with a grain of salt. But in this case, it is very true. The plot was so deeply layered and well thought out I was half expecting a scene where

someone spots Pennywise while driving through Derry, or of someone eating a bologna and Bermuda onion sandwich (has anyone else noticed King's character's obsession with this sandwich?), or that Jack was committed to Juniper Hill Asylum because this book does have that amazing degree of creepiness that Stephen King has perfected. Then again, there IS a yellow lab, a dog species which Koontz often has traipsing through his plots. This is a dangerous book of "one more". One more chapter and I'll do the laundry. One more chapter before I start dinner. One more chapter and I'll call and order a pizza deliver. One more chapter ... eh, the kids are old enough to make themselves a sandwich when they get hungry. Be prepared to have a very unproductive day because this book is incredibly fast paced and there is no good place to set it down and walk away. I was constantly wanting to find out what would happen next and was not disappointed. There were quite a few editing errors but the storyline more than made up for the annoyance.

This was my first Jeff Gunhus novel. It won't be my last. There was a comparison to King and Koontz in the description, which I normally find both off-putting and false. In this case it's fairly accurate, as Gunhus has created a suspenseful and layered plot, and interesting, multi-faceted characters. Jack Tremont moves his family to Maryland after an accident. Instead of leaving trouble behind, things ramp up when his young daughter is targeted by a madman. When the child disappears, he must delve into the secrets of his small mountain town. He must answer the question of what a father willing to do to save his child. Although I figured out who the bad guys were before they were revealed, this didn't detract from the story, particularly since they, too, were multi-dimensional with motivations that were not obvious. Best of all, the ending allows for the possibility of a sequel. An excellent read.

I started reading this book and the beginning encourages the reader to continue as the pace was just right. However, the rather unpredictable turns and twists of the book especially the surrealistic psychic characters involved, many of whom were just evil, and somehow side-tracked me. I found that I could not keep up with the author's imaginative writing style. This was distracting and gave the feeling that the scenes portrayed were a bit forced and needed the added psychic, gory twists to keep the reader interested. I would not recommend this book to readers, who are not into psychic, highly imaginative thrillers. Many readers can handle thrillers, even far-fetched ones, provided that there is a hint of the credible. The lack of any credibility because of the psychic slant, surrealistic cave scenes with superhuman, psychic players that I found rather distracting and marred what could have had the potential of being a great, thriller.

I downloaded the sample of this book on a whim and before I'd even finished the first chapter, I knew I'd found a winner. Night Chill is a rich, meaty, very well-written supernatural thriller that made me sit up and take notice. I download lots of kindle samples before I decide what to buy, and most of them never lead to a purchase, especially in the horror genre because the market is saturated with so many poorly written dime-store slashers and glittery monster romance novels. Not my thing. While Night Chill isn't one of the scariest novels I've ever read (those books would be Summer of Night by Dan Simmons, Let the Right One In by John Ajvide Lindqvist, and The Haunting of Hill House by Shirley Jackson), the writing was just so good that it really didn't matter. There are plenty of hair-raising moments and more than enough suspense to keep the reader eagerly turning the pages late into the night. The main characters are richly brought to life and very believable, the dialogue and situations feel natural, the pacing is fast but not rushed. I could tell that this book was written by a very talented writer who takes his work seriously. Those who enjoy the talents of Stephen King, Dean Koontz, Jack Ketchum, Dan Simmons, and Robert R. McCammon should really enjoy Jeff Gunhus as well. He's the real deal, folks. Loved this book and looking forward to reading the sequel, Night Terror. Highly recommend!
