

I bought this book as it was considered the "gold standard" by my friends who had passed the exam. It's pretty thorough and inclusive of the subject matter, but for me it was hard to distinguish the critical information from the supplemental details. This is a huge book and there are a lot of details. I eventually reached information overload and was stressed out to the point that I couldn't even stand to look at the part of the room where the book was sitting. I switched to a borrowed copy of the Eric Conrad book and found his book to be better hierarchically organized and more concise. However, even though I abandoned the rest of the text in this book around chapter 4, its practice exams and glossary continued to be helpful to me as I studied from other books. So I don't personally consider this book the "gold standard" and I wouldn't necessarily recommend this book over the others, but I wouldn't dismiss it completely, either. If you're undecided I would recommend reading a few pages of the different study books that are available to see what seems to work best with your learning style.

The book is pretty good for explaining exactly what I need to know, which is not always common with the books that are chosen from my professors. However, I downloaded the Kindle version for

convenience, and there is literally no organization past just the chapters, and a page in the beginning with the sections. I have other books for similar courses that have page numbers, or the sections within each chapter listed in the contents menu. However, this edition has nothing which makes it tedious to find sections that I am looking for. What is the point of an electronic copy if it is less convenient than a paper one? Overall, I recommend the book, although sometimes it is a little wordy or redundant, but only in its paper form.

First and foremost I passed the CISSP exam on the first try using this book. Please read the rest of this review carefully if you are thinking of purchasing this book. Read the title of the book "CISSP All-in-One Exam Guide, Fifth Edition" - This is not a tech manual, it is a study guide as clearly outlined in the title. If you are looking for a book to keep on your shelf that you want to lookup real word security issues, then this is NOT it. However, if you want to pass the CISSP exam using a "get to the point Exam Guide", then this is the one you want. I tried reading the ISC2 CBK 2nd and I could not do it. It wandered off of to topics that are not on the CISSP exam. Case in point, it is a "Body of Knowledge" and not a to the point "Exam Guide". Shon Harris has broken the material up in small enough sections so if you have a problem area then you can concentrate on your problem area in the book. Use this book and CCCure's CISSP quizzes (\$40 for 90 days access) and you can identify your weak areas, fix them and pass the test. I passed the test using CCCure's questions (EXCELLENT) to test my knowledge and this book to improve my weak areas and I PASSED. Just a few points when you take the exam. I took the exam on September 18, 2010 in Wayne PA. I received email notification that I passed on October 20, 2010. I submitted the additional information for job history and endorsement on October 25, 2010. On November 16, 2010 I received another email saying I am now a CISSP and my docs will be mailed to me within six weeks. A of Thanksgiving Day (Today) I do not have a certificate. So, as you can see, it can up to 90 days to actually provide proof that you have an in hand certificate.

Where to begin?-CISSP exam- it's a 6 hour 250 question exam with a free colonoscopy.-CISSP book- very down in the weeds type of book. I did not use the CD but pounded the heck on the practice exam. Not as "reference book" as the CBK but it will help you understand the course material. There are some typos but every tech book has typos. I was getting 70 to 80% on the practice test before I was even comfortable with taking the exam. Coming from a very technical background I had difficulty in the "management" domains. The book helped me in understanding those parts.-Qualitative Value- It's a good book for studying but you have to complement it with

some other material. You CANNOT pass the exam on the book alone. ISC2 changed the exam (January of 2014) with a bunch of drag and drops and more scenario based questions. You have to know the material and how it applies to the situation. Unfortunately, this book does not prepare you for that. I don't think there is anything out there that can help explain the situations. You just have to know the material and how it applies. -Quantitative Value- For less than \$50 it's a great deal to include to your library. The exam costs \$600 and the job salary automatically jumps you a good 20K (depending on your locality and previous education and job experience). It's a good deal-Professional Impact Analysis - Buy the book, buy other books, go to CCCure for more info, buy another book, question your existence, reason out why you need this, buy the same book but different edition, curse out loud and register for the exam, fail the exam and repeat the process/pass the exam and feel a euphoria you never felt before then realize the responsibility you have in protecting the world from all the bad stuff it generates. If you get the CISSP you will be the IT superhero. Good luck.-BTW- I passed the exam in under 4 hours and my colonoscopy came back as CLEAR. Woohoooo!

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
